



# Learning the Lessons National Strategy for Neighbourhood Renewal

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Sound analysis, inspiring ideas, effective delivery



### The study

- Two-year impact study of the National Strategy Neighbourhood Renewal (2001)
  - AMION consulting (top down statistical analysis)
  - ECOTEC (in-depth case studies)
- 21 deprived neighbourhoods and 12 local authorities
- 700 in depth interviews and 36 resident focus groups
- Analysis of SOA change data, local strategies and reports
- Rich evidence base:
  - impact; what worked; where next?



### **NSNR** achievements

"Within 10 to 20 years no one should be seriously disadvantaged by where they live"

- Ambitious aim. Has it been met?
  - Arrest and reverse the wholesale decline of neighbourhoods
  - Should no longer be accepted that people on low incomes suffer from failing conditions and services
- What's the evidence?
  - improved services
  - increased investment in neighbourhood infrastructure
  - increase in community spirit and involvement
  - targeted services for young, elderly, women (less so BME and disabled)
  - resident/stakeholder perceptions of quality of life improvements

Spatial interventions important for tackling 'neighbourhood effects'...













### **NSNR** achievements

- Ambitious aim. Has it been met?
  - All neighbourhoods in the country should be somewhere people can see a future for their family... X
  - rather than somewhere where so many people's number one priority is to move out?
- What's the evidence?
  - dissatisfaction with local jobs and employment and training services
  - lack of housing choice and affordability
  - fear of crime (youth and gang-related violence)
  - community tensions (recent immigration)

... but serious structural and local cultural problems remain



### **NSNR** achievements

"Lower worklessness, less crime, better health, better skills, and better housing and physical environment, narrowing the gap with the rest of the country"

# What worked? Delivery chain

- Supportive and flexible national policies
- Strategic leadership and 'steering' of neighbourhood renewal from LSPs
- Integration of physical (especially housing) and economic policy with neighbourhood renewal by local authorities
- Neighbourhood management: intermediaries to gather intelligence, translate programmes & 'create space' for public-private-third sector solutions
- 'Animation' of residents through involvement in improving and delivering local services

Multi-level governance, strong regeneration leadership & continuity critical



# What worked? Funding

- Funding for supplementary services to tackle embedded problems
  - substantive education, employment and youth programmes
- Incentivising/nudging providers towards more neighbourhoodfocused, responsive, preventative modes of service delivery
- Revenue funding for neighbourhood management and revenue/capital for small-scale neighbourhood interventions

#### However important weaknesses. NRF often...

- Insufficiently targeted and additional (to existing services)
- Mono-sectoral and/or 'siloed' (themes)
- Short-term (not strategic)
- Distracting (NRF became NSNR)

Resources are required from the centre to tackle deprivation... but must be evidence-based, joined-up & long-term




# What has worked? Resident engagement

- **Benefits** of resident involvement tended to outweigh the costs
  - can improve the responsiveness and take-up of local services (i.e. effectiveness)
  - boosts capacity, sense of belonging and trust (residents and service providers)
- 'Neighbourhood brokers' (neighbourhood management orgs and frontline service providers) most successfully engaged residents
- Availability of additional funding to nudge/incentivise providers important
- However potential impact of NSNR reduced by...
  - Over-reliance on formal consultative and representative modes
  - Tokenistic consultation exercises /fatigue
  - Under-utilization of Community Empowerment Fund to widen engagement
  - Existing neighbourhood capacity
  - Lack of awareness/publicity

Resident involvement is an easy win... but Big Society needs structure & resources

# Where next? New localism

- Local government and its partners to define where to target investment, and the level of investment required.
- Local government and its partners to determine the specific emphasis on service/behavioural/economic factors, depending upon local context...
- ... allied to an increased level of challenge, negotiation and reward from higher tiers of government



### Where next? CLG: intelligent broker

- Challenge LAs to develop medium to long-term strategies for deprived neighbourhoods (5-10 years)
  - Multi-level governance, existing service budgets, identification of strategic gaps, evidence-based, partnership solutions
- Negotiate strategies through peer review process
  - Agree relevant targets and level of extra funding, strong brokerage role for CLG (vertical and horizontal)
- Reward based upon delivery of strategies and relevant (and achievable) outcomes
