#### **Draft Government guidance on LEAs**

•Draft guidance seeks to:

Set duty in its context (ie. "Partnerships for Growth"/regeneration framework)

Provide clarity around the purpose and aims of duty

Set out broad principles and themes that should underpin assessments

Set out the framework for taking forward the new duty and where it fits within local, sub-regional and regional strategy and delivery architecture



# Why are LEAs important for localities?

•Enable local authorities and partners to develop a shared evidence base and shared understanding of the strengths and weaknesses of the local economy

•Help to ensure that different economic interventions at different spatial levels are aligned and complementary and based around common assumptions of local economic conditions

•Local planning/transport/housing/employment & skills policies etc all drawing from a consistent economic evidence base

•Tool for linking regional policy with localities thereby helping to shape regional strategy

•With less resources the need for accurate understanding of economy is all the more important



# Draft guidance – What is expected of localities?

•Identify factors that impact on <u>businesses</u> in their area and the economic well-being of <u>communities</u>

•Need to understand the functional area over which the key markets operate and frame assessment around this

•Place based - need to understand the wider picture but also identify economic priorities for specific localities

•Local authorities should collaborate in preparing assessments where there are strong economic linkages

•Need common approach and common evidence base across each region to inform regional strategy





•Government will not be quality checking assessments per se

•But process/framework ensures that there are checks in place:

Consulting/engaging LSP & LAA partners integral

Partners to test and challenge LEA assumptions

LAA negotiations to test/challenge evidence

CAA to monitor how assessments have been used to inform policy priorities

Regional strategy & LDFs informed by LEAs- evidence for both thoroughly tested through EiPs



# Comparability

•Although scope for flexibility – element of consistency needed to enable areas to be compared

•Need to ensure comparing like with like

- •Crucial for development of sub-regional and regional economic policy
- •Processes for developing LEAs & regional strategy need to be aligned

•Partners to develop regional framework for determining how LEAs inform regional strategy & enable different areas to be compared

•Develop common approach across each region based round core evidence base



# **Key Challenges for Local Authorities**

• Make an honest assessment of your localities' contribution and place in the wider economy & mutual dependencies with other areas

•Build assessment around functional economic area whilst not losing sight of particular challenges of specific areas & neighbourhoods

•Look at what your assessment reveals in terms of the potential for developing economic partnerships with other areas

•Not a bid document - need honest appraisal of economic strengths, weaknesses and opportunities

•Not just a data gathering exercise – need to tell a story of place – where it has come from/where it is now/where it is going in the future



#### **Key Challenges - continued**

•Engage with businesses/understand their needs & what is hindering local business investment

•Use assessments to help fulfil sustainable development requirements – impact of economy on the environment & impact of environmental risks

•Think about the future direction of the economy ie. in context of climate change and ageing population

•Look for synergies between other social & environmental evidence bases (ie. crime, health needs, child poverty) and LEAs

•Different LA departments need to work together



### Support on offer

•IDeA national programme of support

•Key regional partners – RDAs, regional observatories, regional statisticians

•Local authorities and key partners need to come together at a regional level

•Standardise and share data/avoid duplication of effort/joint procurement of data/pool capacity

•RIEPs need to think through how they can support capacity building

•Government Offices stand ready to support/broker relationships



## What Next?

•Timing of new duty can never be perfect

•Plan timeline setting out how LEA will inform strategies & funding decisions ie. SCS, LDF, LAAs & regional strategy

•How can first assessment inform next suite of LAAs (2010/11-2013/14)?

•Regional authorities need to think through how local evidence bases will inform development of evidence for first regional strategy

•CAA will look at how local authorities have used assessments to inform policy priorities
